

Gary Lazdowski: 45 Year Rotarian!

Born and raised in Oakland, California, Gary Lazdowski moved to Concord at the age of 16, but did finish his parochial school in Oakland. Following high school, he attended St. Mary's College, where he was not an "A" student, and maybe not even a "B" student! At the time, a fellow student's family was connected with the Concord garbage company and offered him a job working weekends. Now, 50 years later, he can proudly say that he's scaled from driving a truck to becoming the GM and COO. They remain a family-owned business, and have grown to 380 employees, from the

28 when Gary began.



The Club is grateful that Gary's never once considered moving to another Rotary closer to his home.

They bought the Rio Vista garbage company in 1974 and he has been directly connected to Rio Vista ever since. Interestingly, to this day, the same father and son drive the garbage trucks in Rio Vista—despite not living here. They live in Pittsburg, where the trucks are deployed.

Their company has a partnership in Napa, which includes Paradise. As he mentioned previously, 33 of the 35 employees in Paradise, lost their homes. They have since found jobs for 1/3 of the employees, with the others either moving from the area, or working on the removal of debris. FEMA estimates there are 6M tons of demolition material. To put this in perspective, that is roughly what Rio Vista generates in 30 years.

In closing, Gary offered shopping bags to be used at Lira's exclusively; and recalled his welcome to Rio Vista by John Abel, Rex Smith and Jack Dolk—who gave him grief for raising rates, and threatened to open their own garbage company!
