

Meals On Wheels - Solano/Napa



"Where's the Beef?" Laurie Hartmann's organization lost major Federal Government funding for in-home food delivery.

Laurie Hartmann, Executive Director of Meals On Wheels, Solano County, gives an eye opening presentation on the challenges of delivering 190,000 meals per year. Meals on Wheels, is now in its 41st year in Solano County and the program is critical to the health of seniors. By working together they can help keep seniors healthier, happier, in their own homes, and feeling more connected to their community as they age. Many of the seniors they serve live in poverty, are isolated, and rely on the volunteers to provide nutrition and daily interaction. To be in the program a recipient must be at least 60 years old and unable to drive a car.

Meals On Wheels is funded by donations from organizations such as Genentech, First Northern Bank, and Kaiser Permanente They also receive funds from the cities of Fairfield and Vallejo and the counties of Napa and Solano. A large portion of their funding comes from the Federal Government, but the in-home delivery funds were severely cut back during early 2018, which required them to scale back the operation.

They now, for the first time, have a waiting list of 114 seniors to get onto the program. For many seniors the home delivery program is the only meal they get each day. Some service clubs are starting to step up and help with additional funding. There continues to be more and more demand for food as seniors are living longer and have a desire to age in their own home.
