Realizing that it would be a long trip, they selected a stylish state room on their chosen 180-passenger ship.

They boarded their ship in the Mediterranean, and spent the next 18 hours traveling 119 miles through the Suez Canal. The Canal was funded by the French and built with Egyptian labor from 1859 – 1869. The fees generated from the canal represent Egypt's 3rd largest industry, with traffic of about 23,000 ships each year. Hale witnessed enormous 2500+ container ships navigating the canal. Interestingly, fees are based on the commercial value of the ship, with higher commercial value ships given priority. To ensure the safety of cargo and tourist ships, there are security points every 10K along the route. Also, because there are no bridges spanning the canal, the government has set up areas where pontoons can quickly be deployed to create bridges across the entire span within 25 minutes. Interesting fact: Turkey, Russia and Egypt are the only three countries in the world that span two continents.

From the Gulf of Suez, they turned into the Gulf of Aqaba, and docked in Jordan. At port, they learned the importance of wind energy in the region, taking photos of huge wind turbines being offloaded. While not sure of the significance, they were told that Jordan boasts the world's 5th tallest flag pole.

After their excursion in Jordan, they were back out to the Red Sea. Hale educates history-deprived Rotarians with some fascinating data—Cairo, Egypt was founded in 3400 B.C., making it 5,500 years old; the population of Egypt is 96 million people, and Religions are, Islam, Coptic Christian, and Judaism.

In Egypt, they visited Sharm El Sheikh, Egypt, also known as the City of Peace, a reference to the large number of international peace conferences that have been held there. Here, they visited mosques, and witnessed how religion impacts commerce. For instance, since Muslims do not drink, there are no Arabic signs on liquor stores.

From here, they were off to the Valley of Kings and Temple of Karnak. Hale

learns that all tombs lie on the west bank of the Nile where the sun sets. The west bank is considered the side of death, while the east bank represents the side of birth. They also learn, interestingly, that King Tut's tomb is famous primarily because it was one of the few tombs that was not robbed. It was discovered, recently, in 1930.

From here they boarded their ship and headed into the Gulf of Aden, between Somalia and Yemen, an area previously known for piracy.

Lion Ron Jones and Lion Frank Reid, on behalf of Lions, donate \$500 for a charity of Rotary's choosing. Feeling the holiday spirit, Rotary then donates \$1,000 to be used for their Hwy 12 sign.
