The problem? Patty was not a 5' 8", white male—which was the base criteria for patrolmen in the 60's. Fortunately, her other qualifications far

exceeded that of her classmates, and she was brought on
as a reserve. Three and a half
years later, she would become
the first-ever police officer in
Antioch. It did not come
without its challenges. She not
only dealt with an all-male
culture, but was blasted in local
papers, and was even required
to ask her husband's permission
to work at the time.

Patty progressed to investigations, where she handled homicides, narcotics, sexual assaults, and ultimately also handled hostage negotiations. With this broad skill set, she continued on to became a Field Training Officer, where she was responsible for rookie training.

Little did she know that she would meet the love of her life one memorable Sunday while on duty. Patty was called to break up a bar fight, while Jay was on scene to administer first aid. Apparently during this first interaction, Jay made a stinging comment. It must not have stung much—as they married a short time later.

Two peas in a pod, they both went back to school to complete their Masters in Emergency Services Management, which furthered both of their careers. This led to her working high profile cases, until the point she unexpectedly became Grandma Patty at the ripe age of 42. She retired, and Jay became the Fire Chief for Cordelia. As they needed a support system, Patty joined his team, where she remained for 12 years. She also served on the Delta Fire Board for 12 years.

Patty glows with pride having made history in Antioch, and paving the way for women today. She remembers a Sergeant telling her, "Depending on whether you work out, will determine whether we will hire more women." The rest is history.
